CHRISTIAN AID WEEK - United we can do many things

We tend to take it for granted that we have clean water, on tap, all the time. To walk for up to 24 hours to collect drinking water is unthinkable. Yet this is what is happening in many parts of Bangladesh, and it's the women and children who do it. In the low lying wetlands, the land is flooded for more than half the year and underground water sources can be contaminated with arsenic. In the south west, the rise in sea levels, partly as a result of climate change, is making fresh water salty. Christian Aid has teamed up with The Bangladesh Centre for Advanced Studies to set up Water Councils. Through these the people are learning how to harvest

Extracts from April's Parish Council

Speeding Traffic on A37: It was reported that a hi-tech survey is now being carried out, the usage of the road is being monitored so too will the problem of traffic being at a start and stop position and the pollution being caused.

Refurbishment Programme Signal Crossing – Pensford Bridge: Due to the age and condition of the existing street furniture at the signal crossing there has been a need identified by B&NES to replace the equipment. The existing pedestrian crossing will be replaced between Sunday 20th April and Wednesday 23rd April. Proposals have been discussed with the Primary School. Parish Council suggested clerk contact the department involved to make them aware of possible works to bus shelter.

Bus Shelter: B&NES still await approval from the Department for Transport for the Greater Bristol Bus Network Scheme and will contact the Clerk when they receive further news.

Gullies: Clerk confirmed that Highways have a map showing all the gully locations within the Parish and will let the Parish Council have a copy in due course. **Parsonage Lane:** The problem of blocked gullies was reported and dealt with by B&NES.

Woollard Lane: A correctly spelt road name has now been put up.

Street Closure Events: Clerk was asked to look into the procedure for a street closure. B&NES need a minimum of 16 weeks notice and a cost of £176.25 plus VAT or £141.00 for a registered charity would be payable.

National Parking Laws: It was reported that these will come into effect and enforced under the Traffic Management Act locally from Monday 31st March. The aim is to keep roads safe and help beat traffic congestion. There will be an introduction of two levels of penalty charge. £50 lower charge for lesser offences such as an overstay at a parking meter. £70 higher penalty for parking on a double yellow line, bus stopping area or loading bay. Penalty notices can also be served by post in certain circumstances e.g. driver drive off. Wheel clamping can be used for persistent offenders. Councils are to produce annual reports on parking activities. Greater powers will be given to Parking Adjudicators. Parking attendants will be known as Civil Enforcement Officers.

Culvery Wood: It was reported that the walks through the wood are very overgrown with brambles and is in need of maintenance. Properties in Station Approach are losing their view gradually as the wood becomes more mature.

The Making of Somerset

Les Cloutman led a large audience of U3A members on a breathless journey covering 4,000 years in the history of our county. His starting point was the breaking of the land bridge with the continent and the subsequent separation of our island flora and fauna from our neighbours. Over the next two millennia some of the land was cleared for agriculture and animal husbandry and the climate gradually warmed until around 2,000 BC and the Iron Age. Gradually trade routes developed and metal such as tin from Cornwall and copper from the Welsh hills were exported to the continent. During the Iron Age several waves of immigrants moved across the country changing the population, more land was cultivated, forests cleared and animals grazed on the grassland. It was at this time that the peat bogs on the levels were laid down. By the time of the Roman invasion the population of Somerset was increasing, villages were scattered on the fertile levels, fish

farming, cultivation and animal husbandry were well established. There is extensive evidence of the Roman mining activities still to be seen on the Mendip Hills and evidence of Roman road building is all around us today. After the Romans and through the Dark Ages the Saxon invasion reached the borders of Wales and many of our village names date from those days. The name Somerset originally meant "The Summer Land" as much of it was used only during the summer months, Somerton became the County Town, the centre of a thriving and productive region. The audience was breathless as Les eventually brought the picture up to the present day. May brings the end of the year for U3A. PUBLOW WITH PENSFORD MU

We had a surprising and most interesting talk at our meeting on 10th April. The surprise was that few of us knew of the existence of Partiss College, which we were to hear about and which, from the panoramic picture we were shown, is a truly magnificent building in Bath completely hidden from a thoroughfare. Jill Harman is the Bursar there and she was able to tell us much of its history and present day use. Built of Bath Stone in 1826 for Mr and Mrs Partiss as a family home, but they had no children and in 1849 it became a much sought after accommodation for 'Distressed Ladies' being funded by a Trust set up by Mr Partiss and his wife. It now houses clergy widows, retired professional ladies and what used to be called retired Governesses, although no applicant is turned away before they have been really introduced to the accommodation and its facilities. In the Old days every prospective resident was 'vetted' and they were required to produce their Birth Certificate, proof of Baptism and to state WHERE they had been communicant. There were a number of rules to be adhered to such as Everyone to be in

by 10.00pm and all washing to be taken in from the garden by 4.00pm each day, no gossiping among the residents etc. Obviously the rental has increased over the years but apparently it is still a very fair charge for all its amenities. It is called a college because Mr Partiss never wanted it to be known as an Almshouse. There are 30 separate houses created within this impressive mansion, each entirely self contained with its own front door and small back garden which has to be tended by the resident. Their church is in the centre of the building and there are communal rooms for parties, concerts, fairs and the like, for those who wish to join in. Partiss College is not a Nursing Home and a really sick person would be taken to hospital for care. The Trust set up by the Partiss Will still funds this exceptional place and it plans to continue for many years.
